Of course, I would like to extend thanks to our gracious donors who continue to support the Foundation's mission of enhancing public education in our community. The Foundation's success depends on the willingness of donors to give, and we are incredibly appreciative

of your support. I would also like to recognize our Foundation staff and board members. They spend countless hours working to ensure the Foundation is able to enhance public education in Great Falls through student and teacher recognition, scholarships, grants, and facility enhancements.

In the past few years, we have seen an increase in school-initiated community fundraisers for facility enhancements. The Foundation is glad to play its part in processing gift receipts and acknowledgements for these efforts. Riverview Elementary celebrated the completion of its playground project in August. In September, both Sacajawea Elementary and CMR High School kicked off their fundraising efforts for a new playground and a renovated CMR Hall of Fame, respectively. We are very impressed with the commitment of PTA and staff members in pursuing these initiatives.

Thanks to funding from the Robbins-de Beaumont Foundation, the Foundation initiated a new offering for teachers called the Immersive Professional Learning grant. This pilot program encourages teachers to pursue unique and immersive experiences and to share their learnings with colleagues in the district. Next year one teacher will travel to Nepal for a Mount Everest school exploration and trek while another will travel to Hawaii to explore volcanic activity in the region as a result of this funding. We look forward to seeing what they discover in their travels and how it impacts student learning in our community.

While we are excited for these and other new projects, we sadly recognize that the basic needs of some students are not being met. Since 2012, the Foundation has proudly funded food pantries for all schools in the GFPS District. We know that hunger negatively impacts a child's ability to learn and grow, and we are thankful for the numerous donors who mitigate food insecurity for our youth. We encourage you to read our feature article to learn about the volunteers who make the food pantry program possible.

In June, I will be stepping down from my two-year position as Board Chair and passing the baton to Joanie Agamenoni, who has served as the Scholarship Committee Chair the last several years. Since joining the Board, Joanie has played an integral role in the success of the Foundation, and she will do an outstanding job serving as Board Chair. Suffice it say, the Foundation is in very good hands and well positioned to continue to improve public education in Great Falls as we work our way through 2023 and beyond.

Parent: Angela Semenza







Why: Mrs. Dehaan was the first teacher to experience me at my worst, yet she still managed to have a big impact on how I grew after my 4th grade year.






TEACHERS OF THE YEAR

Steve Skaer, Mathematics Teacher, CMR High School

According to CMR Principal Jamie McGraw, students fight to get into Mr. Skaer's classes, and parents rave about the learning that happens with his guidance.

"Steve differentiates his teaching to meet individual students' needs from Algebra Prep to college level Dual Credit classes. He continually models for kids what it means and looks like to stand for kindness, integrity, compassion, perseverance, honesty, and hard work," said McGraw.

A 22-year educator and eight-time Excellence in Education Distinguished Educator, Steve has served as the mathematics department head at CMR for four years and received during his career the Dufresne Outstanding Educator Award, Teacher of the Year as selected by the student body, and the National Honor Society Doctorate of Service award. Truck Raffle Raises \$149,400 for Students

For the last decade, the City Motor Company and Oakland Family have generously partnered with the Great Falls Public Schools Foundation to raffle a donated Toyota vehicle each year. Since the raffle started in 2013, City Motors has contributed over \$275,000 to cover the cost of the vehicles each year. The community has donated generously to more than quadruple their investment, raising \$1.2 million for student groups and our grant programs. Since 2016, North40 has bolstered the truck raffle by donating a \$1,000 gift card which motivates even more people to participate. We are grateful for the continued support of these two businesses, which make this raffle possible.

This selling season 14,940 truck raffle tickets were sold, which raised \$149,400, making 2022 the second highest selling year ever! Student groups sell tickets for \$10 each. The group keeps \$6 per ticket to use for programs, equipment, or other ways that support the student group. Meanwhile, the remaining \$4 goes to the Foundation for classroom grants. Every dollar spent on a ticket stays in the community and benefits Great Falls schools and students. That has meant money for everything from field trips and new science equipment to sports gear and playground equipment.

The winning tickets were drawn at the Crosstown Football Game on Oct. 21, 2022. Great Falls resident Tammy Dues won the new Toyota Tacoma truck. She purchased her ticket from the Great Falls High School Golf team. Victoria Hunt won the \$1,000 North40 gift certificate. She purchased her ticket from the CMR Cross Country team.

Foundation Awards \$139,721 in Grants in 2022

In 2022 the Great Falls Public Schools Foundation awarded \$139,721 in grants to assist classrooms and programs across the district for the 2022-2023 academic year.

Teachers often have new ideas for their classrooms and schools but do not have access to needed funds due to tight budgets. Discovery grants—usually between \$500 and \$3,000 each - provide teachers the means to implement their ideas. Meanwhile, groups of teachers or schools also may apply for larger Innovation grants - up to \$10,000 - for projects of greater impact.

Since the inception of the grant program 10 years ago, the Foundation has distributed over \$1.2 million for grants in the district. Grants are primarily funded by the proceeds of the annual truck raffle, which is made possible by City Motor Company and the Oakland family.

Many people associate the Great Falls Public Schools Foundation with classroom grants and scholarships. We're certainly proud of those programs, but we also take a quieter role in helping students, particularly those in need.

The Foundation is the primary supporter of school food pantries, and we also contribute to the food backpack program.

"There's wide consensus that hungry children struggle to learn," said Stephanie Schnider, executive director of the Foundation. "The problem is too big for one organization to handle. Fortunately, the community has come together to feed students, and our donors allow us to help with that."

Of the 10,000 students in our schools, nearly five percent are homeless and more than 40 percent qualify for free and reduced lunch. The needs are so widespread that every public school in Great Falls has a food pantry. And every elementary school has a backpack program that provides a small bag of food each Friday to children who may otherwise not have enough to get through the weekend.

"We have seen an explosion in need," said Shaun Tatarka, executive director of the Great Falls Community Food Bank. "The Great Falls Public Schools Foundation makes it possible for schools to address that need quickly and directly through the school food pantries."

Feeding students and their families is truly a community-wide effort that takes place on many levels. Many schools, for example, conduct their own food drives. Several organizations also collect food and give it directly to school pantries or to the food bank. Others donate funds, either to school pantries through the Foundation or to the food bank to purchase food.

At the Foundation, we've found we can be most helpful by making sure that every school pantry has the food it needs. Representatives from each pantry can "shop" at the food bank to select the supplies it needs, paying 19 cents per pound for most nonperishable items. Meat and produce are also available. But the food bank doesn't bill the schools, it bills the Foundation. Last year the Foundation paid about \$60,000 to ensure that every school pantry remained stocked.

"We are so very grateful to our donors, whose generosity allows us to continue funding these high-need programs," said Schnider. "But we're also thankful that so many volunteers from across the community step up to make sure food gets to students."

First Interstate Bank, for example, not only collects food and raises funds, but their employees show up at school pantries to help organize and distribute food. Several churches provide employees who help stock pantries and assemble food backpacks. PTA members and school employees on their time off also show up to help. Malmstrom has provided teams of airmen to help. Other volunteers come from the ranks of service organizations, private businesses, school clubs, and friend groups.

Together, we're trying to make sure that hunger is not a burden for our students and that every student goes to school ready to learn.
